Book of the Week: Are People Basically Good? by R. C. Sproul

Richard Baxter was vicar of Kidderminster from 1647 to 1661. In an introduction to this reprint, Dr. J.I. Packer describes him as 'the most outstanding pastor, evangelist and writer on practical and devotional themes that Puritanism produced'. His ministry transformed the people of Kidderminster from 'an ignorant, rude and revelling people' to a godly, worshipping community. These pages, first prepared for a Worcestershire association of ministers in 1656, deal with the means by which such changes are ever to be accomplished. In his fervent plea for the discharge of the spiritual obligations of the ministry, Baxter, in the words of his contemporary, Thomas Manton, 'came nearer the apostolic writings than any man in the age'. A century later Philip Doddridge wrote, 'The Reformed Pastor is a most extraordinary book...many good men are but shadows of what (by the blessing of God) they might be, if the maxims and measures laid down in that incomparable Treatise were strenuously pursued'.

Hope and Joy in a Season of Grief

God is Always Faithful

Grief comes in a variety of ways: death, loss of a marriage, loss of a job, loss of a friendship, change in political climate, and the list goes on. Regardless of the cause, the results can be the same—a loss of hope that manifests itself in a tangled mess of emotions.

In my life, grief has been both a compassionate and a cruel teacher. Let me explain this statement by sharing with you my story. In 2003 a tragedy hit my family that spiritually put me in despair for years. My 24-year-old daughter, mother of my second grandchild, let go of the last drop of hope she had and took her own life, leaving the care of her daughter to my husband and myself. One question haunted me: Why would God use something so tragic as suicide and leaving a toddler an orphan as part of His perfect plan for me? My days were filled with doing what needed to be done and the joy of a toddler running around escaped me. The joy of watching her grow in her trust of others had been masked by my lack of hope. Like

my daughter, I had lost hope. I could feel nothing but bitterness, anger, discontentment, fear of the future and resentment, not towards the world or my circumstances but towards God. I was not practicing Philippians 4:8. There was nothing in my thoughts that was praiseworthy, only blame. Finally, God used my circumstances to humble me. I asked God to forgive my sins of lack of trust in God's plan and the accompanying anger and resentment I had towards God because my plans had been changed. The good shepherd welcomed me back into the fold and through prayer and reading the Word, my lost hope was once again securely anchored in Christ (Hebrews 6:19). Along with that, my inexpressible joy for the Lord returned.

Woman Losing Hands and Legs to Amputation After Suspected Bad COVID Vaccine Reaction, Jab Was Required by Her Employer: Report

Two years ago, Jummai and Philip Nache were looking for money to spread their faith to African immigrants in the Minneapolis area.

Now, according to a GoFundMe page set up to raise money for Jummai, the Nigerian couple are desperate as the North American Mission Board and Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptist Convention try to help them endure the impacts of a possible reaction to the coronavirus vaccine.

Just over \$100,000 had been raised toward the fundraiser's \$500,000 goal by early Monday.

In the message on the GoFundMe page, Leo Endel, executive director of the Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptist Convention, said that "Jummai has undergone the amputation of her two legs below the knee and will later lose most of her two hands."

"What lies ahead is an expensive and painful journey of healing that will include costly prosthetics, additional surgery, and necessary modifications to their lifestyle including modifications to their home and a different vehicle," Endel said.

The post includes a description from Philip Nache of what took place after his wife received her second dose of the Pfizer vaccine on Feb. 1.

Nache said his wife was required to take the vaccine by a Minneapolis clinic where she worked.

She suffered chest pains after her second dose, her husband said. Several days later, he wrote, she went to an urgent care facility, where an EKG showed she had no heart trouble.

However, a coronavirus test — five days after she was vaccinated — came back positive, Nache wrote.

He said that on Feb. 14, after she had been transferred to the University of Minnesota Medical Center, "the doctor called and told me that her heart was deteriorating, her oxygen levels and blood pressure were low and she needed to be put on a ventilator. I gave approval for them to proceed with the ventilator as needed."

Jummai's condition worsened, Nache said, noting that although he suspects the vaccine triggered everything that went wrong, he cannot prove it.





Biblical counseling class on hold while teacher recovers from surgery.


